

ANNUAL DINNER - MARCH 19, 2007

The N.B.H.A. met for our annual dinner and program at 6:30 p.m. Monday, March 19th at Faith Alliance Church. A roast beef dinner was prepared by Ruth Krieg and her girls and the Faith Alliance youth group served drinks and cleaned up tables. Flowers from Wagner's IGA adorned the tables. President Larry Dicke presided, introducing the officers and appointees. Two new trustees were named to replace Mary Paul and Ned Dammeyer, they being Diane Paul and Jim Bruns. After this short business meeting, Larry introduced the speaker, Johann Klein, who told about his young life in Rumania.

Johann Klein was born March 22, 1927 in the little German village of Ober-Eidisch, Transylvania, Rumania, to Johann and Katharina (Emrich) Klein and was educated in the Ober-Eidisch school.

Johann worked on the family's farm until September 1944, when one day during W.W.II, the Russian troops moved into the village, bombing and burning homes. The German Air Force evacuated all the German residents and the Kleins became refugees, taking only the clothes on their backs. They were taken by trucks to Hungary, Austria and Germany, and for 2 months, they passed through air raids, bombed railroads and cities, hunting food along the way.

The Klein family was separated, not knowing the whereabouts of each other. Johann was taken to a farm in Germany where he worked until March 1945, after which he then worked in Lening, Ober Austria until March 1952.

As displaced persons, Johann, his sister Katharina (who later married Allen Sandkuhl - they now live in St. Marys), and his parents applied to come to America. They sailed on the General Sturgiss Army ship for 11 days until it reached the harbor at New York City. Their sponsor, Church World Service, brought the family from NYC to St. Marys, Ohio on March 16, 1952. Johann found work at the St. Marys foundry for 2 years, then worked at Stamco in New Bremen for 25 years.

In November 1953, Johann married Mary Brueggeman and they settled on the ancestral Brueggeman farm where they raised 4 children: Robert, Carol (Deeg), Donald and Joyce (Evers). (All of their family attended the dinner/program and sat at the speaker's table with their parents.)



Johann Klein, Sr. worked at Stamco until his death in January 1969. Katharina became a member of the Senior Citizens' organization when they formed and was a familiar sight dancing in her German garb at Bremenfest picnics, etc. She passed away in March 1986.

In 1965, Johann and Katharina took their first air flight back to their homeland for a 3-week visit with Mrs. Klein's 79-year-old mother, sister, brothers and many of their former neighbors and friends. While there, they were honored with a reception and dance. They enjoyed their visit, but they were glad to get back to the "good old USA".

Johann and Mary keep in touch with people the Klein family lived with in Austria, and also with relatives and friends who left Austria. Some of the refugees now live in Canada, some in Michigan and some in Indiana.





LOCK ONE PROJECT UPDATE

[From past N.B.H.A. minutes & newspaper articles]





All cement has been poured and the metal gates are yet to be put into place – also the landscaping. Lighting along the towpath is being looked into. Plans are being considered to build a lockkeeper's house along the canal to replicate the old one, often referred to as the "Thompson house" after one of the lock-keepers who lived there. The house would contain a museum & restrooms as well as a meeting room, and would be protected by a security system. Cost is estimated to be about \$450,000. A transportation enhancement grant is being sought from the state.

Another project that is being considered is to have a lifesize bronze statue created of a muleskinner and his mule. Cost for that project is estimated to be about \$90,000. We have already received a small donation towards that project!

N.B.H.A. BARN RENOVATION

[From past N.B.H.A. minutes]

The barn project is now finished except for the entrance. The whole project was done with Carl Roediger doing most of the work or overseeing the whole project at no expense to the Historic Association. Doug Roediger also helped his father by doing some of the work.

Electrical work was contracted by Don Applegate. Electrical conduit was installed between the new ceiling and the OSB board with about 8 lights to be put into place and electric heaters to be installed near the ceiling. Susie Hirschfeld and Mary Moeller volunteered to paint the inside of the barn. A new roof is also yet to be put on the barn.

FIRE DEPARTMENT SESQUICENTENNIAL CELEBRATION

June 9th and June 20th will mark 150 years since the founding of the Northern & OberBremen-Cataract Fire Departments (see last issue of "The Towpath"). A book about the history of the various Fire Departments and a celebration are being planned for sometime in June.

DO YOU REMEMBER? (West Du Noch?)

YE OLD TIMERS – Do you remember when the blanket mill of the Backhaus and Kuenzel firm was gutted by fire? 'Twas in March of 1889 (N.B. Sun - 3/22/1889) around the hour of 11:00 a.m. when the bells in the Cataract and Northern Fire Co. fire houses sounded the alarm.

This penciler well remembers the occasion. Looking from a window on the north side of the grade school building on South Franklin St., which at that time also housed the high school, a pall of smoke was seen pouring forth from the upper windows of the building. The fire originated in the picker room in the 3rd story, and after the heat had shattered the windows, the 2 upper stories of the building became a seething furnace, the flames bursting on all 4 sides and then down to the lower floor.

Daring feats were performed by the firemen to keep the fire from spreading to adjoining property. One noteworthy act by Ben Schulenberg, one of the nozzle men of the Cataract Fire Co., was when he climbed a ladder up to the 3rd story and stood up on the south side brick wall and directed his nozzle from this position. We can still see him standing there, and when one takes into consideration that we did not have a "Hook and Ladder" truck at that time, it was surely a daring feat. The Minster Fire Dept. responded upon request for help and after several hours fighting by the Cataract, Northern and the Minster companies, the flames were brought under control.

And do you remember when the "Conrad Drug Store" was set on fire by an incendiarist? The store was located in Herman Laut's building on South Washington St., now owned and operated by Ferd G. Wint as a restaurant.

Mr. Conrad hailed from Toledo, Ohio, where a lot of safe blowers and other bad men made their headquarters at that time. Soon after Conrad had acquired a lease on this business room for a term of years from Herman Laut, he shipped a carload of drugs and other merchandise here and had arranged and advertised a grand opening week.

The fire occurred on Saturday evening when the Republicans of New Bremen & German Township were in mass convention, putting the finishing touch to a ticket to be placed in the field that spring, when the alarm was sounded from the tower of the Cataract Fire Co., then located on Front St., which was followed by an alarm of fire from the tower of the Northern Fire Co. on North Main St., an incident which, of course, broke up the G.O.P. meeting in the 2nd story of the fire house, which at that time was also the Village Council chamber. Both the Cataract and Northern fire companies responded promptly with their fire fighting apparatus, and though the fire had gained a good headway, it was brought under control an hour later.

The origin of the fire was attributed to numerous causes for a day or two. However, when someone took an axe and broke the staves of numerous charred barrels and discovered the contents to be just plain water instead of wine and liquid drugs, an investigation was started by an adjuster of the old Cooper Fire Insurance Co. of Dayton, at that time represented by Edward Purpus, local agent, and it was discovered that the barrels really contained water, and a number of pasteboard boxes had contents of no value whatsoever. The insurance company then started a real investigation which was brought to the attention of the Auglaize County Common Pleas Court.

After an airing of several days, Mr. Conrad failed to put in his appearance one morning, and inquiry revealed that he had left for parts unknown. His failure to return was accepted as silent evidence that someone had applied the torch, and then the case was brought to a close.



DO YOU REMEMBER?

Located on what was the municipal market place was New Bremen's village government building which served as such until the village dads ordered the removal of their meeting place to the newer city building on South Washington St., while in more recent years a second-story room in the Grothaus block on West Monroe St. at the corner of Main St. has become the official council meeting place.

In addition to transacting the town's business at monthly council meetings in the hall of the old Main St. "Engine House", the street level room housed the Northern Fire Co.'s hand fire engine and hose cart and the "Alert Hook and Ladder" truck for many years. The village prison, or calaboose, also was contained in this building and during the early village history was principally used to sober up just plain drunks after wedding and holiday dances. The Village Marshal would call for his overnight charge on the following morning and hail him before the Mayor when a fine of \$5.00 and costs was assessed. Upon payment of same, the overnight prisoner was freed and admonished to not repeat "until the next time."

Harry Fischbach had taken the jail when the N.B.F.D. needed the space for their fire trucks.



(see "The Towpath" – April 2003, page 10.) Philip and Katherine had 3 children: Margaret (Buckingham), Marie (Schmehl), and Theodore Hoffman, all now deceased.




Philip Hoffman, Jr. was the eldest of 6 boys. His brothers were Frederick, Henry, Herman (who died at the age of 8), Konrad and Daniel. Frederick and Konrad were both ministers.

Mother's aunt and uncle, August & Amanda (Dinkel) Mueller, were part owners of Mueller Brothers Clothing Store on the corner of Main and Monroe Streets. They lived at 15 North Main St., cattycorner from the store. The home is still there, but it was completely remodeled and updated in later years. The Muellers had 3 children: Marie, Carl and Harold. Marie's mother, Amanda, played the organ at church and Marie and her father sang in the choir for many years. They were all very musically talented. In 1970, Marie and her mother moved to West Milton where Marie taught music for many years.

I am donating an old book of piano music that was given to me in 1994 by Mom's cousin, Marie Mueller, along with letters she wrote to me about the book. It is called "Golden Circle", was published in 1873 and contains marches, waltzes, polkas and other dance music. The title page was lettered by my grandmother, "Miss Katie Dinkle", in alternating colored pencils when it was given to her by her parents for her 6th birthday (1877). Marie wanted the book to go to "someone who loved antiques and valued the significance of old tattered articles formerly used by family members". I cannot now think of a better place for this very old book than the New Bremen Historic Association.





These are photocopies of the Hoffman and Mueller families, their homes, and my grandparents' automobile. There is also one of the "Interurban on Main St." (which is being sold by the NBHA as a color print.)

My parents, Louis and Marie (Hoffman) Schmehl, lived in St. Marys all their married life. They had 2 daughters, Martha and Carol, when, in November 1927, they bought a small farm east of St. Marys on what is now Route 33A. I and 5 more siblings were all born there – there were a total of 7 girls and 1 boy. All are still living. My father lived there until his death in January 1991 at the age of 91. My mother passed away in 1984 at 83.

I have good memories of New Bremen, but not many, as my grandparents died in their mid-50s (1926 & 1927) - before I was born. My great-grandmother, Maria Anna (Bissantz) Hoffman, died January 16, 1928, 11 days before I was born. My great-grandfather, Philip Hoffman Sr., died in 1920.



I regret to inform you that my aunt, Opal L. Wiessinger, died on February 13, 2007 at the age of 93. Opal L. Baumgardner and my dad's brother, Arlington E. Wiessinger, were married in 1935 and Arlie preceded her in death in 1996.

Opal and Arlie lived in New Bremen for many years and ran the Arcade store in downtown New Bremen. Their last home in New Bremen was the large Victorian home north of town (see next page) that had the barn turned into a carryout called "Barn 66" (later called the "Tastee Scoop" ice cream shop, the former Julius Boesel carriage house burned down on July 22, 1998 – see the October 1998 issue of "The Towpath").



I fondly remember visiting Arlie and Opal and playing with toys in the upstairs of the Arcade, also having family gatherings in the yard to the side of the wonderful spacious home. They eventually moved to Lima, then to Indian Lake – to a home previously owned by Opal's parents, Walter and Bertha Baumgardner of Sidney.

Sometime in the 1980s, Arlie and Opal moved to Florida and lived in various places here until settling in Sun City Center. When Opal's health declined, she moved to Largo, Florida, so that I could care for her in her last days. Just prior to her death, Opal received the 75-year pin for her membership in the Pleiades chapter of Eastern Star, an honor of which she was justly proud and pleased.

Thanks for the wonderful "Towpath". Nice to see good German names of persons I have heard Opal and Arlie talk about for years.

I have a minimal connection to New Bremen as well. The company for whom I worked for 35 years, the Reuter Organ Co. of Lawrence, Kansas, built the pipe organ in the St. Paul United Church of Christ there (in 1956). I understand it has been added to recently and is still working just fine.

ARCADE UNDER NEW MANAGEMENT

With the beginning of the new year (1946), the Arcade Dept. Store, one of the oldest and largest mercantile establishments of New Bremen and contiguous territory, has entered upon a new era of business under the personal management of A.E. Wiessinger, former merchant of Sidney, and more recently, accountant for the Streine Tool & Mfg. Co. of New Bremen.

The change of management took place January 2nd when Wilson Vornholt withdrew as active head of the enterprise after having filled the office temporarily for several years in a highly satisfactory manner.

Mr. Wiessinger is a native of Sidney, where he grew up in the grocery business of his father. After graduation from the International Business College at Fort Wayne, he assumed positions with Sidney finance companies and also for several years conducted the Wiessinger Electrical Appliance Co. in Sidney. When war conditions made it necessary to discontinue this business a couple of years ago, he moved to New Bremen where he took over the accounting department of Stamco until he acquired financial interest in the Arcade. He and Mrs. Wiessinger are now residing on South Franklin St.



ARCADE TO BE MODERNIZED

The Arcade this week launched one of the most ambitious modernization programs ever undertaken by any institution of its kind in this area.



To begin with, the full-length canopy, long a familiar distinguishing mark and under which several generations have sought shelter against sun and rain, already is disappearing. It is being torn down to make way for a small one over the only front entrance the building will have after its face-lifting operation.

Strictly modern in appearance and done in (yellow and maroon) porcelain-enamel and glass, the new entrance will include a smaller door on the north for the business offices on the 2nd floor. Appropriately enough, the company name will appear above the center entrance and will be topped by an attractive 19' perpendicular sign carrying the Arcade name on both sides in letters 24" high. The sign, in matching (maroon) porcelain-enamel, will be brightly outlined at night by a battery of hidden lights.

Like the canopy, the old-style display windows will have to go, to be replaced by new visual windows giving an unobstructed view of the interior. Excavation directly beneath the building will add a large basement. As conceived now, it will be used by 2 departments – houseware and paints. On the main floor, the grocery and meat department will be enlarged to more than twice its present size. Other changes and innovations will convert it into a supermarket.

The building's interior will be redecorated in individual color schemes for the various departments and equipped with the latest in modern furniture and fixtures. In the dry goods department, there will be light birch fixtures; in the men's clothing department, there will be limed oak; and so on through the store.

October 15, 1950 is the date tentatively set for completion. After that date, New Bremen will be the home of one of the best and most modern department stores to be found in communities many times its size.

Incorporated early in 1903, the Arcade probably has had its share of ups and downs the same as other business ventures that have weathered the test of time. It resulted from a merger of 4 firms – Rabe's Cheap Store, Speckman & Nieter, Faehl & Nieter and Fred Wiemeyer's Cash Clothing Store. The late Theodore Rabe generally was recognized as heading the merger. August Faehl, East Monroe St., is the last surviving member of the original organizers. (He died 12/31/1951.)



GERMAN OBITUARIES TRANSLATED

This is to let you know that I have completed translations of the German obituaries that appeared in New Bremen's German newspaper, "The Stern des Westlichen Ohio" before there was a "New Bremen Sun". This covers the period of April 2, 1885 thru March 22, 1888. There may also be 20 or so obits for the 1900s, but they are hit and miss. Many times these German obits give more information than their English counterparts.

These obituaries have been placed in a large 3-ring binder in the New Bremen library near the microfilm reader and microfilms, next to the obituary files, and contain both the German version and the translated version. Stern des Westlichen Ohio (Star of Western Ohio)

The first newspaper established at New Bremen was the weekly Stern des Westlichen Ohio, a German language paper, which was started in 1873-74 in Minster by school teacher John V. Schiffer. On December 1, 1879, Theodore Purpus bought the paper and moved the business to New Bremen. In May, 1900, he sold it to his nephew, Fridolin T. Purpus, and Emil G. Conradi (brothers-in-law), who operated under the firm name of Purpus & Conradi in the Ed Purpus building (former IGA building) for three years. In April 1903, they took over The New Bremen Sun and published both papers across the street in the Grothaus building. In 1905 the Home Printing Co. was organized, with E.G. Conradi serving as President and F.T. Purpus serving as Treasurer. They continued to publish the Stern des Westlichen Ohio until 3/8/1923, when there was no longer enough interest to continue a German newspaper.

[EDITOR'S NOTE: If you are interested in looking for material in the German papers, there are 8 reels of microfilm for "The Stern des Westlichen Ohio". The first reel covers the period of 4/2/1885-3/22/1888. The other 7 reels cover the time period of 5/29/1902-3/8/1923.]

New Bremen Records (copied by Grace Scheer) Pg. 129 - Late 1865

An Ordinance to prevent interment within the limits of the Corporation of New Bremen.

- 1 If any person or persons bury any person on the burying ground within the limits of the Corporation of New Bremen, he shall be fined in the sum not exceeding \$50 nor less than \$25.
- 2 That if any person or persons bury any body on the burying ground within the limits of the Corporation of New Bremen, the Marshal of this village is hereby empowered and shall cause any body entered contrary to such prohibition to be taken up and buried outside of the limits of the Corporation at the expense of the party so doing.
- 3 The foregoing ordinance shall be in effect from the date of the passage of this ordinance.
